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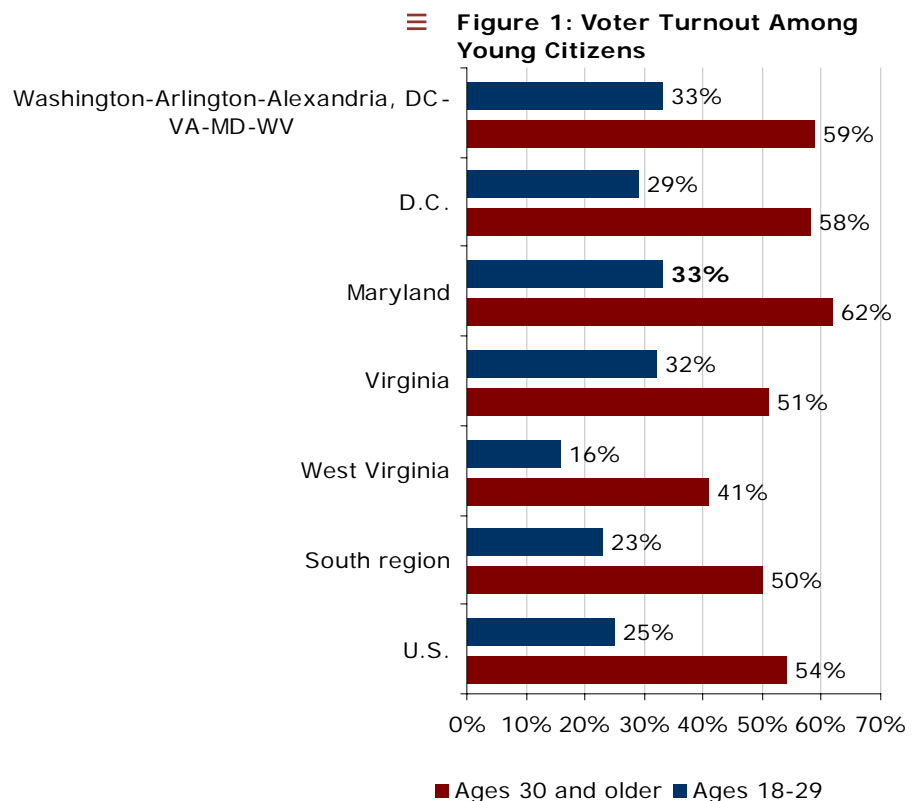
### Quick Facts about Young Voters in Washington-Arlington-Alexandria, DC-VA-MD-WV<sup>1</sup>: The Midterm Election Year 2006

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The 2006 midterm election was the second major election in a row that saw an increase in the electoral participation of young people ages 18-29. Between 2002 and 2006, the percentage of eligible young people who voted increased by 3 percentage points to 25 percent, the single largest increase among all age groups nationally.<sup>3</sup>

In Washington-Arlington-Alexandria, DC-VA-MD-WV, the voter turnout rate among young people was 33 percent, four percentage points above D.C.'s average, and eight points below the national average. An estimated 206,000 young people from Washington-Arlington-Alexandria, DC-VA-MD-WV, voted in the 2006 elections.

There was a 29 percentage point gap between young people and adults in the U.S., and this gap was smaller (26 percentage points) at the more local level of Washington-Arlington-Alexandria, DC-VA-MD-WV.

## Voter Turnout Among Subgroups in Washington-Arlington-Alexandria, DC-VA-MD-WV

White non-Hispanics, college graduates, and married people were the only subgroups of young people that had a turnout rate of 40 percent or higher. All subgroups of young people voted at lower rates than did their adult counterparts. See Table 1.
