### Quick Facts about Young Voters in Detroit-Warren-Livonia, MI<sup>1</sup>: The Midterm Election Year 2006

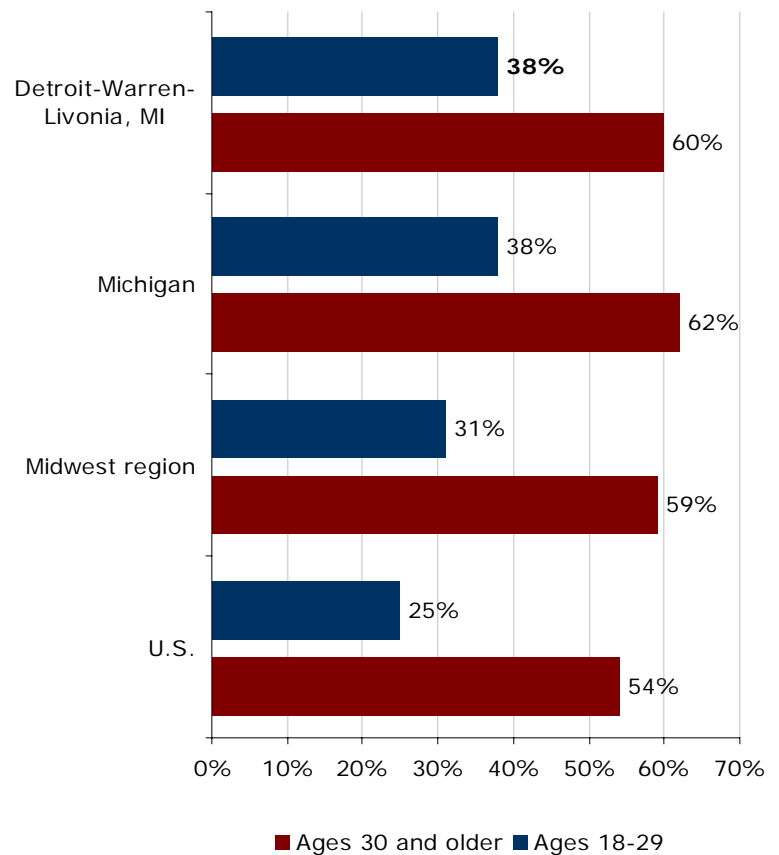

The 2006 midterm election was the second major election in a row that saw an increase in the electoral participation of young people ages 18-29. Between 2002 and 2006, the percentage of eligible young people who voted increased by 3 percentage points to 25 percent, the single largest increase among all age groups nationally.<sup>3</sup>

In Detroit-Warren-Livonia, MI, the voter turnout rate among young people was 38 percent, on par with Michigan's state average, but thirteen points above the national average. An estimated 222,000 young people from Detroit-Warren-Livonia, MI, voted in the 2006 elections.

There was a 29 percentage point gap between young people and adults in the U.S., and this gap was smaller (22 percentage points) at the more local level of Detroit-Warren-Livonia, MI.

## Voter Turnout Among Subgroups in Detroit-Warren-Livonia, MI

Men, high school graduates, and single people were the only subgroups of young people to vote at lower rates than the metropolitan average. A few subgroups of young people voted at a rate of 40 percent or higher (women and individuals with at least some college experience). All subgroups of young people voted at lower rates than did their adult counterparts. See Table 1.
