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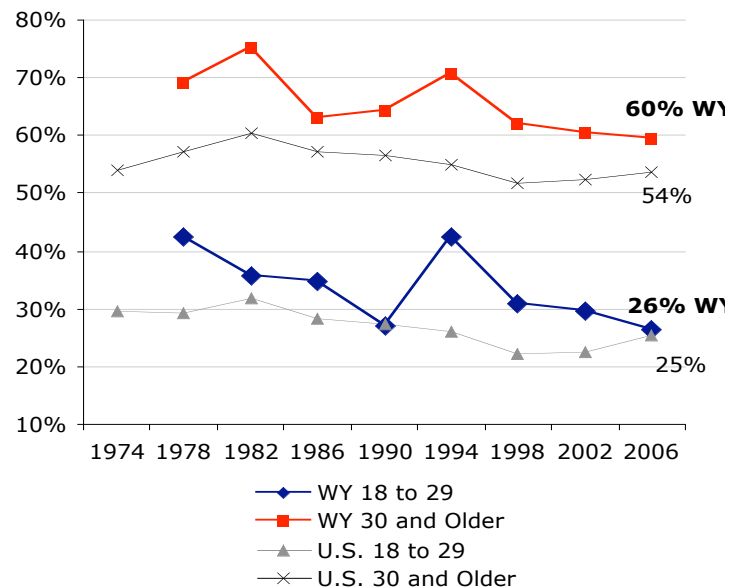

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### Quick Facts about Young Voters in Wyoming: The Midterm Election Year 2006

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The 2006 midterm election was the second major election in a row that saw an increase in the electoral participation of young people ages 18-29. Between 2002 and 2006, the percentage of eligible young people who voted increased by 3 percentage points to 25 percent, the single largest increase among all age groups nationally.<sup>2</sup> However, while youth electoral participation improved between 2002 and 2006 nationally, in Wyoming, the youth voter turnout rate fell 4 percentage points from 30 percent in 2002 to 26 percent in 2006. Overall, Wyoming ranked 25<sup>th</sup> (tied with VT) among all states and the District of Columbia in 2006, down from 8<sup>th</sup> in 2002, yet was one percentage point higher than the nation as a whole.

This fact sheet reports the characteristics of young voters for the state of Wyoming, including estimates of the number of young voters, and voter turnout rates in 2006 and 2002 for various sub-groups of young people.

### Voter Turnout Statistics in 2006 and 2002

In 2006, a midterm election year, there were an estimated 86,000 young people in Wyoming eligible to vote in U.S. elections. Table 1 shows voting statistics for the years 2006 and 2002.<sup>3</sup>

### Voter Turnout Rates in 2006 and 2002 Among Eligible Young Citizens

Table 2 displays voter turnout rates for various groups of young people in 2006 and 2002 in Wyoming. While Wyoming's youth voter turnout was slightly higher than the national average in 2006, voter turnout among some youth groups in Wyoming was very low. For example, young people with a high school education or less, and married men had turnout rates below 20 percent.
