### Quick Facts about Young Voters in Miami-Fort Lauderdale-Miami Beach, FL<sup>1</sup>: The Midterm Election Year 2006

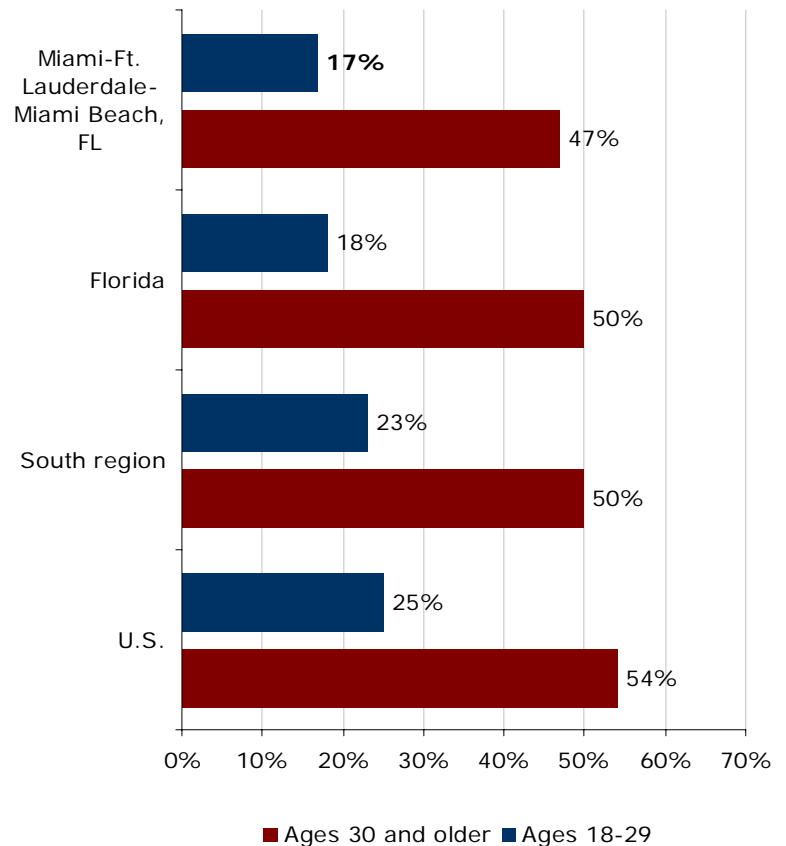

The 2006 midterm election was the second major election in a row that saw an increase in the electoral participation of young people ages 18-29. Between 2002 and 2006, the percentage of eligible young people who voted increased by 3 percentage points to 25 percent, the single largest increase among all age groups nationally.<sup>3</sup>

In Miami metropolitan area, the voter turnout rate among young people was 17 percent, one percentage point below Florida's state average and eight percentage points below the national average.

There was a 29 percentage point gap between young people and adults in the U.S., but this gap was bigger (30 percentage points) at the more local level of Miami-Ft. Lauderdale-Miami Beach, FL.

## Voter Turnout Among Subgroups in Miami-Ft. Lauderdale-Miami Beach, FL

Overall, voter turnout in the Miami metropolitan area was very low. Latinos, men, and high school and college graduates were the only subgroups of young people to vote at lower rates than the metropolitan average. All subgroups of young people voted at lower rates than did their adult counterparts. See Table 1.
